

## **Egyptian Objects**

North Hertfordshire Museum has some objects from Egypt. Let's look at at these objects: beads, two amulets and a houshold God. Go onto Ehive (<a href="www.ehive.com">www.ehive.com</a>) and look for them. Type in **the** number and click on the result for the whole entry.

<u>Beads</u> **1976.1695** these are made out of faïence. This is a mixture of glass and clay, and has strong colours (usually bluey green, but red is also found) and stays shiny for thousands of years. These have a lucky charm of a scarab on them. These are called amulets and they were worn for luck and protection. Today we might wear a St Christopher, a symbol of our religion or a birthstone.

<u>Bes</u> **1976.1653** Bes was a god of the home and happiness. He brought good luck and this is an amulet to be worn on a bracelet or necklace.

<u>Wadjet Eye</u> **1976.1650** This is the lucky eye which was worn to keep off bad luck. If you read the story you can see how it became such a popular good luck charm that eyes are still painted on boats in the Mediterranean thousands of years later.

Osiris 1934.1653 This Egyptian god was found near Weston. It was a god that belonged to a person living here in Roman times. It may be that this was the personal family god of a Roman who had lived in Egypt for a while. Then later, they or their descendants moved to Hertfordshire, bringing the Egyptian god with them.
