7 January 12pm North Herts as seen through the eyes of its artists

Views of North Hertfordshire have been captured by artists, in many different forms over the ages, from oils to watercolours, prints to drawings.

To start off 2025, Ros Allwood will take you through over 150 years of art, focusing on the scenery of our district. Some spots you may recognise, while others have completely disappeared...

This is following on from the popular talk 'Hitchin as seen through the eyes of its artists' which you may have attended last year.



22 January 7.30pm

A Tale of Toys

Everyone remembers playing with toys when they were young. Perhaps you still have your favourite childhood teddy bear now!

Our museum service has been collecting toys for over a hundred years, donated by people who have outgrown them. Recently our Curator Matt Platt has been thinking about the tale of the toy: when did they first emerge? What sorts of things did people play with in the distant past? Are toys from back then similar to today? Find out which toys have been spending their retirement years in our display cases in this evening talk.



II February 12pm

Vesuvius: what, why and will it happen again? The last time Mount Vesuvius erupted was in 1944, during the Second World War. This volcano normally erupts every year, meaning now it is overdue. In this lunchtime talk, our Education Curator, Cas Sanders, will be looking at the great eruption of AD 79 that buried Pompeii, studying first hand descriptions of the event, searching for clues to make predictions and asking what may happen next time.





II March 12pm

Tall Tales of William Gerish

William Blyth Gerish was a folklorist based in Hertfordshire in the early 1900s, who had a great passion for outlandish tales.

Investigating everything from simple local traditions to grand accounts of dragons, witches and highway robbers, Gerish wrote these dramatic stories of local legend into a series of 19 pamphlets which he published between 1905 and 1921. Curator Matt Platt will be diving into these tall tales told by Gerish including the story of 'a Hertfordshire St George' and poor Jane Wenham, the infamous Witch of Walkern.

26 February 7.30pm

Sexual and Gender Dissidents in History

Despite centuries of treating gender as a binary and sexuality as a single 'norm', there have always been those whose sense of self does not fit into these prescribed categories.

To celebrate LGBT+ History Month, our Curator Keith Fitzpatrick-Matthews will be looking at some characters whose lives stand out for not caring about those categories and even fighting against them.



26 March 7.30pm

From Yemen to Letchworth: the ceramic work of Abdo Nagi

Before our Abdo Nagi exhibition, join Ros Allwood for a talk about this internationally renowned potter. Explore his roots as a Yemeni goatherd and his life and work in North Herts until his death in 2001. We'll walk you through how his heritage influenced his forms and also look at other 20th century artists, such as Lucie Rie, who influenced him.



8 April 12pm

Arbury Banks, Senuna and Venus: exploring an ancient landscape

We've traditionally looked at ancient monuments and archaeological sites as special and isolated places.

Modern techniques allow us to open up entire past landscapes, creating links between these places. We can begin to fill them with people and, at times, start to understand how they perceived the world around them. Join Curator Keith Fitzpatrick-Matthews in this lunchtime talk to learn more.

23 April 7.30pm

First Aid Nursing Yeomanry

Learn how the First Aid Nursing Yeomanry didn't take no for an answer, in this evening talk from Education Curator Cas Sanders.

The First Aid Nursing Yeomanry was formed during the Boer War but did not come into its own until the First World War. The nurses travelled



to France, turning rat-infested ruins into state-of-the-art hospitals and coolly going into the thick of battle to do things that even Major Generals found surprising!

The Second World War gave this entirely voluntary service a chance to prove its worth. Young women who were fluent in languages went to occupied Europe, risking their lives. Today if you join, you may be called upon to help in a terrorist attack or work in secrecy. No more does a woman need her own horse, just intelligence and some courage.

The Roman Empire from Caesar to collapse - £7.50 each or £50 for all 8

The Roman Empire from Caesar to collapse

If you like Roman gossip or just love listening to our curator, Keith Fitzpatrick-Matthews, then this series of talks is for you! Told in chronological order, he will delve into the lives of the emperors throughout the ages. You can join us for one or sign up for all eight at once and enjoy a monthly jaunt around the Roman Empire.

The Julio-Claudians and Flavians (the 'long first century') 19 March, 7.30pm

Julius Caesar became sole ruler of the Roman state; in the aftermath of the Civil War following his assassination, his great-nephew Octavian established a dynastic system. The Augustan Settlement, as it is known, lasted until the suicide of his great-great-grandson Nero in AD 68. The chaos that followed was resolved when Vespasian's victory led to the dynasty of the Flavian emperors, ending with the assassination of Domitian in AD 98.

The Adoptive Emperors (the 'second century')

16 April, 7.30pm

The elderly Nerva was chosen as emperor in AD 98 and for almost a century, each emperor chose his own successor by formal adoption. The system broke down when Marcus Aurelius chose his son Commodus as successor. As so often in Roman history, a neat sequence of what were known as the 'good emperors' ended in assassination and Civil War.

The Severan Dynasty and the Crisis of the Third Century 14 May, 7.30pm

Septimius Severus emerged as the victor in the Civil War of the 190s; his dynasty lasted until the assassination of his great-nephew Alexander in 235. Following this, we enter a chaotic period in which generals vied with each other to rule the Empire, inflation was rampant and military defeats caused a catastrophic decline in imperial confidence. The crisis ended with the death of Carinus, in 285.

The Tetrarchy and the Constantinian Dynasty ('the fourth century') 18 June, 7.30pm

Diocletian became emperor after defeating Carinus in 285 and set about a series of deep-seated reforms to the empire, its government and its finances. Setting up a system of joint emperors in the East and West, each with a subordinate, it became known as the Tetrarchy ('rule of four'). By the 320s, Constantine I had gained effective sole rule, establishing a new dynasty that expired with the death of his son-in-law Julian in 363.

The Valentinianic and Theodosian Dynasties ('the short fifth century') 16 July, 7.30pm

After the brief reign of Jovian, Valentinian I and his brother Valens gained control of the empire, which was briefly reunited under Theodosius I. After his death, different branches of the dynasty continued to reign until Marcian, who died in 457. During this time, the Western Empire began to disintegrate, partly under the pressure of invasions from east of the Rhine.

The Leonid and Justinianic Dynasties ('the long sixth century') 20 August, 7.30pm

In the East, Leo I founded a short-lived dynasty; after the death of his son-in-law Zeno, the elderly Anastasius undertook important reforms and was succeeded by Justin I, whose dynasty lasted until Maurice was executed by Phocas. In the West, a succession of increasingly weak emperors reigned until the child Romulus was deposed in 476 by Odoacer. He refused the title of emperor and sent the imperial regalia to Zeno, acknowledging him as his overlord. Justinian I's attempt to reconquer the West foundered partly for financial reasons and partly from the effects of Plague.

The Heraclian Dynasty ('the seventh century') 17 September, 7.30pm

Heraclius I rose against Phocas in 610 and established one of the empire's longest lasting dynasties. It had the misfortune to see the rise of the Arab states after the foundation of Islam, losing the Levant and North Africa to them, and the transformation of the Empire from an urban dominated Late Antique society to a medieval agrarian state resembling the kingdoms that were becoming the norm across Europe. Like so many Roman dynasties, it fell with the execution of its last member, Justinian II in 711.

Aftermath: from the Isaurian Dynasty to the fall of the Empire I5 October, 7.30pm

The history of the Empire from Leo III to Constantine XI. AD 717-1453, is often seen as one of long, inevitable decline. This is far from true: there were periods of considerable success and resurgence, but the Crusaders' sack of Constantinople in 1204 was the beginning of the end. However, the Ottoman conqueror of Constantinople, Mehmet II. saw himself as the successor emperor, a claim recognised by the Patriarch of Constantinople and the Ming Emperors of China; the rulers of Moscow from Ivan III Vasilyevich, husband of Constantine XI's niece, also claimed the title.

From Yemen to Letchworth: the ceramic art of Abdo Nagi

The museum is delighted to be exhibiting work by internationally known potter Abdo Nagi (1941-2001). Born in Yemen, he spent his early childhood as a goatherd. Aged twelve, Nagi walked to Aden, where he found domestic work, coming to Letchworth with his employer in 1967. After taking O- and A-levels in art, he became pottery technician at Hitchin College, and from there gained a ceramics degree at Middlesex University. Abdo Nagi spent his life in Letchworth perfecting his pottery shapes and glazes, from early domestic wares to elegant stoneware vases and dishes with metallic rims. His work has been increasingly sought after since his death in 2001. The exhibition includes pieces from the museum collections and many private loans.









The Arches display space hosts temporary exhibitions all year round. These exhibitions are formed either from our own collections or from artists and groups who apply to hire the space.

We have an exciting schedule for the rest of 2025 including beautiful displays from some local artists and celebrations of our local history.


Our popular 80s vs 90s Disco is back once more to battle it out! Party all night long to classic anthems from two of music's best decades.




Dance Fit


